



Pancake Faces












Instructions

- 1. Lay out all the ingredients around the pancakes and set up the mirror. A phone camera would also work.
- 2. As the child looks into the mirror, ask them to make a happy face.
- 3. Using the fruit and sweets, ask the child to make a face that looks like their happy face.
- 4. Then ask the child to look into the mirror again and make a silly face.
 Ask them to change the position of the fruit and sweets to match their silly face.
- 5. Do the same for an angry face and a lemon sour face or any other feeling you think would work.
- 6. Talk about which face the child likes best and then make that face on the pancake and add the honey, syrup, jam or cream.

That's it! The pancake is ready to eat!

Rainbow **Treasures**

You will need

a collection of pebbles • paint for the 7 colours of the rainbow brushes
 old plates or plastic food trays • old paper to protect your work surface •

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1. Red



2. Orange



3. Yellow



4. Green



5. Blue



6. Indigo



7. Violet



Tip If you don't have the 7 rainbow colours, use what you have, like Pip and Posy!

For adults Chalks also work well but can't be varnished or left outside. Acrylic paints will last longer.



Instructions

- 1. Before the child starts to paint, test the colours on a spare pebble. Darker pebbles may need to be painted white first to let the rainbow colours show through.
- 2. Place the 7 colours of paint onto the plates or food trays. Using different brushes for each colour stops them from mixing. Or you can paint all the red stripes first for example.
- 3. Using the colour guide, paint curved stripes of colours on to the pebbles in the order shown.
- 4. Once dry, paint with the clear varnish if you intend to put the pebbles outside. Allow to dry.

That's it! You've made Rainbow **Treasures!**

Once your pebbles are complete you can use them to play a hide and seek game or to make a trail leading to a surprise! They can also be used to decorate your garden and home.



Make and Race a Duck!


You will need


some plastic 2L size bottles with lids removed • large scissors • small scissors • tape • acrylic paint (including white) • thin brush • thick brush • medium or thick black permanent marker • old plates or plastic food trays for paint. old paper to protect your work surface

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Instructions for adults


- 1. Print the template sheet and cut out as shown.
- 2. Cut around the bottle about half way up. It helps to pierce a hole in the plastic first to put the scissors into. Placing the bottle on its side on a towel will keep it from slipping. Take extra care. Discard the top half.
- 3. Roll the paper template into a cylinder, place inside the bottle base and push down as shown. Position the duck's head so that it is centrally over two of the base stands. Tape the paper in place.
- 4. Using the permanent black pen, trace the shape of the duck's body, the lines of the eyes, bill and feathers on the outside of the bottle base. Colour in the centre of the eyes in black. Join the lines where the tail meets at the back.
- 5. Remove the template and keep to make another duck.
- 6. Using the small scissors roughly cut around the body shape and discard the waste.
- 7. Cut in more accurately and tidy up any sharp points.






Tip for adults Cutting in towards a point from both directions is easier than cutting out from the point.



Instructions for children

1. On the inside of the bottle and using the thin brush, paint the duck's eyes white and the duck's bill orange. Allow to dry.



2. With the thick brush, paint yellow all over the inside of the base, avoid the eyes. Allow to dry.



That's it! You can make more in different colours or with names on if you want to race them!

The ducks will float on water or slide on a smooth surface. Decide where the start and finish lines are. Place the ducks at the start and blow at their backs until they cross the finish line!
